RE: <u>Juvenile Drug Testing Statistics (October 2006)</u>

Drug testing of juvenile arrestees for October 2006 revealed an increase in the levels of substance abuse detected for marijuana and amphetamines, which were up 6% and 2% from September, to 55% and 3%, respectively. The level of substance abuse detected for cocaine decreased 1% to 2%, while PCP remained the same at 3%.

The Juvenile Drug Testing Unit tested 211 respondents prior to their initial hearing in October. Fifty-six percent (56%) of the 178 Lockup cases tested positive. Fifty-five percent (55%) of the 33 Community cases tested positive. The combined positive rate was 55% -- up 6% from September.


