Key Data and Operational Information FY 2025 (Quarters 1 through 3)

FY 2025 Release and Rearrest Rates (through 6/30/25)

- During the first three quarters of fiscal year (FY) 2025:
 - 89%** of cases filed in the District of Columbia Superior Court, and
 - 54%** of cases filed in the United States District Court for the District of Columbiaresulted in defendants being released to the community, either on personal recognizance or conditional release.
- During the first three quarters of FY25, there were **15,871 defendants** awaiting trial in the community. Of this number:
 - Over **92%** were charged with a **non-violent crime**,
 - Less than **4%** were charged with a **dangerous and violent crime**, and
 - Less than **4%** were charged with a **violent crime** as defined in DC law.
- Of all defendants awaiting trial in the community during this period:
 - 90%** remained arrest-free, and
 - 1.20%** were rearrested for a dangerous and violent or violent crime.
- Of the 10% of defendants who were rearrested, **81%** were rearrested for **misdemeanor** charges.

FY 2025 Rearrest Rates for Defendants Charged with Violent Crimes (through 6/30/25)

- Of the defendants originally charged with a dangerous and violent or violent crime, **less than 2%** were rearrested for a new dangerous and violent or violent crime.

FY 2025 Key Performance Indicators (through 6/30/25)

ARREST-FREE RATE

Percentage of defendants who remain arrest-free.

COURT APPEARANCE RATE

Percentage of cases in which defendants awaiting trial in the community make all scheduled court appearances.

89%
